ARMED FORCES DAY

St Helens Borough Council have marked this year's Armed Forces Day with several online events but one event did take place in-person: a special ceremony at Victoria Square to unveil a new name on the Cenotaph, that of Pte. Ralph Mercer, a St Helens soldier who was killed in action on 6 March 1943 at the age of 31.

Pte. Mercer served in India with the 13th Battalion, The King's Regiment (Liverpool) during the Second World War and was a recipient of the Burma Star. He is commemorated in Myanmar. The event was attended by members of Pte. Mercer's family, including his daughter Mrs Beryl Williams, who joined Mayor of St Helens Borough Cllr Sue Murphy to unveil the name (pictured right), council leader Councillor David Baines and our Armed Forces champion, Cllr Lynn Clarke.

REFUGEE WEEK: #WeCannotWalkAlone

We celebrated Refugee Week with a programme of inclusive events organised by the council's dedicated Resettlement Service celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary here.

The theme of the week was 'We Cannot Walk Alone', and around the borough a series of painted footsteps have been placed to signify the journeys people have made to come here. They feature the slogan 'Our Warm Welcome', which is a local charity working to support asylum seekers and refugees in our communities. They were also heavily involved in organising the many great events which took place last week.

Two friendly football matches took place between councillors and members of the borough's refugee community, kindly hosted by Newton Sports Club (pictured on the front cover of this report and right) and Thatto Heath Crusaders; a range of crafts, classes and reading sessions were held at local children's centres; and Café Laziz, a popular community café, hosted events at The Hope Centre in Windle (pictured right). Local schools got involved too, with a variety of online dance and creative writing workshops.

NEW WAYS TO WORK CENTRE OPENED TO OFFER SUPPORT

Mayor of St Helens Cllr Sue Murphy and Metro Mayor Steve Rotheram were among those today at the opening of a brand new centre in St Helens to help jobseekers and businesses with employment issues.

Located on Bridge Street, the Ways to Work centre will see experienced St Helens Borough Council staff who are part of the Liverpool City Regions flagship Ways to Work programme, collaborate with Career Connect and Jobcentre Plus to offer a one-stop shop service to support local people through mentoring, coaching, advice and guidance, and job searching.

Since launching in 2016, the St Helens Ways to Work team, who prior to Covid-19 were based in St Helens Town Hall, has helped more than 1,200 people into employment, training, and education – 230 of those coming in the past year during the coronavirus pandemic.

Joining the Mayor and Metro Mayor were Council Leader David Baines, Town Centre Labour councillors Carole Ann Gill, Anne McCormack and Michelle Sweeney, and Councillor Kate Groucutt, St Helens Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Business. WORKING TO IMPROVE SERVICES FOR RESIDENTS

Making sure services for residents are continually improved is a key priority. One of the ways Councillors achieve this is by attending regular Scrutiny committees, a statutory Council responsibility since the Local Government Act 2000.

In these meetings Councillors review services provided by the Council itself and with our partners such as the NHS, education, the police and many more.

Cllr Mancy Uddin is Chair of the Overview and Scrutiny Commission which oversees all Scrutiny work as well as giving Councillors and members of the public the opportunity to improve the quality of council services and help shape council policy. The Commission plays an integral role in setting the Council's budget for the year ahead and St Helens Labour is committed to ensuring our residents get the best value for money.

Cllr Trisha Long is Chair of the Children and Young People's Services Scrutiny Committee which monitors services that help our borough's children and young people get the best start in life. Recent outcomes include recommendations resulting in improvements in mental health services, work-related experiences and the protection of our children from criminal exploitation, alongside monitoring support for schools during the pandemic.

Cllr Robyn Hattersley is Chair of the Place Services Scrutiny Committee. Recently, the committee has undertaken work around the Council's Prevent strategy; the Council's use of paper and plastic and the Council's Domestic Abuse strategy. This year, the committee has a full work programme and will be looking at the Council's waste collection service, the library service and the effects of the new fire station.

Cllr Dennis McDonnell is Chair of the Adult Health and Social Care Scrutiny Committee which scrutinises NHS services and care for our elderly and vulnerable adults to ensure high standards are maintained. The committee also monitors services' responses to the pandemic to make sure residents are protected. and scrutinises initiatives to prevent suicide.
