2022 began with Covid still affecting our daily lives, and concerns growing about energy bills and the cost of living...

- Community testing and booster vaccines were still very much part of our lives in January. Meanwhile the one year anniversary of Merseyside's first mass vaccination site at Saints was celebrated with a special event at the stadium. Throughout the pandemic, our council, voluntary sector, local NHS, and GPs worked hand in hand to keep the community as safe as possible. **We thank all those involved for all their amazing efforts**.
- Businesses in St Helens Borough like HAMMA Academy of Sports and Martial Arts have been able to grow thanks to funding support from Labour Metro Mayor Steve Rotheram's £500,000 Town Centre Fund. Our Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Business, Cllr Kate Groucutt and Saints coach Kristian Woolf were invited down for the official opening of their new gym: https://tinyurl.com/2kcw529b.
- Labour members and supporters were out campaigning across the borough, speaking with residents about the growing cost of living crisis and Labour's plan to lower energy bills.
- Our Labour Cabinet almost £4m in funding to deliver a number of ambitious projects to support residents from all different backgrounds into employment and training: https://tinyurl.com/2p8wcsn8. Cllr Kate Groucutt said: "I was very proud to bring to Cabinet today two reports outlining investment totalling nearly £4million in employment support and job creation for residents of our borough. Supporting residents to get into employment or training, and progressing to skilled and secure jobs, is one of our key objectives as a Labour-run council."
- We marked Holocaust Memorial Day with a special online service.
- Work began on the rebuild of Ashurst Primary School in Blackbrook.
- Cabinet approved a new draft Housing Strategy for St Helens Borough with the clear vision of 'Quality and accessible homes for all'. The strategy sets out the borough's future housing needs, the council's commitment to building quality and accessible homes for everyone, and to improving and strengthening neighbourhoods over the next five years:

Cllr Jeanie Bell said: "Emerging from this challenging time, we now have a period of opportunity to reset our expectations in relation to housing with transformational regeneration planned for our Town Centres, a new Local Plan and clear priorities within our Borough Strategy, our Housing Strategy sets out the central role that housing will have in improving our borough."





International events dominated the headlines this month as Putin began his invasion of Ukraine. Meanwhile locally work got well underway on several major projects...

- The iconic Steve Prescott Bridge was lit blue and yellow in **solidarity with Ukraine**. Community groups and volunteers came together to organise donations and support, and in March hundreds would attend a special vigil in Victoria Square to hear from speakers including Cllr David Baines, Cllr Jeanie Bell, and Ian Umney who had just returned from a 1700 mile journey to rescue his family from Ukraine and bring them safely to St Helens.
- The council agreed a five-year deal with a delivery partner to bring a new attraction to St Helens town centre. In October 2021, the council went out to tender for a contractor to create and operate a **food and drink offer utilising upcycled shipping containers** as a meanwhile use on the former Chalon Way carpark in Foundry Street and in February we were pleased to announce that Steel Life Group Ltd. had been confirmed as the successful contractor winning a £1m contract. The project has seen delays outside of anyone's control but it is expected to be open this Spring.
- Planning permission was granted for improvement works as part of a **£15m investment in the area around Lea Green**: https://www.sthelenslabour.org/latest-news/2022/02/16/15m-sustainable-transport-scheme-gears-up-as-walking-and-cycling-works-receive-planning-permission/.

Welcoming the decision Cllr Richard McCauley said: "This is a huge step forward for our borough and as a Cabinet we are delighted that the plans have had the backing from the public. It shows that businesses, residents and visitors are ready for us to get to work in transforming Earlestown and St Helens town centres."






April began with the launch of our election manifesto, ahead of May's elections. We also marked International Workers Memorial Day and more...

Election won, and back to work...

- Labour won the local election in St Helens Borough with a strong, clear majority and a mandate to deliver our plans for the borough
 in the next four years. Labour won 29 out of 48 seats after receiving over 50,000 votes that's 52.5% of the vote, and an increase of
 10.7% on our vote share last year. We thank everyone who voted Labour for your support!
- After the election, David Baines was re-elected Labour Group leader and Leader of the Council. He said: "I'm pleased to have been re-elected as Leader and I'm looking forward to getting straight back to work. Our Labour council will work hard for you in the next four years to deliver our manifesto commitments, and I want to thank all those residents who voted Labour and all my excellent Labour colleagues, members and supporters for their hard work in the campaign and all year round. I would also like to thank all our amazing council staff who administered the elections professionally and impartially. It literally couldn't happen without them. A lot done, more to do. Back to work!"

September's agenda included investment into our digital infrastructure, further funding bids for regeneration, and the countdown continued to the Rugby League World Cup...

- A state-of-the-art fibre exchange is being rolled out across St Helens. The first stage is being built in Peasley Cross as part of a £30m investment by **CityFibre** to bring full fibre connectivity within reach of almost every home and business in the borough.
- With 50 days to go, Council Leader David Baines, Cllr Richard McCauley, Saints and Tonga coach Kristian Woolf and St Helens town
 centre businesses encouraged residents not to miss out on attending one of the biggest sporting events in the world when the
 Rugby League World Cup comes to St Helens this autumn: https://tinyurl.com/4943v2m8
- Our council-run Ways to Work Centre in St Helens, in partnership with the DWP, ran a Jobs Fair at St Helens Town Hall. A number of live vacancies with local and national employers were available. This was just one of a number of similar events we've organised or hosted this year in order to help local people into **employment and training**.
- Stunning **Victoria Park** in Windle won the prestigious Green Flag award for the 8th consecutive time: https://www.sthelenslabour.org/latest-news/2022/08/01/victoria-park-win-8th-consecutive-green-flag-award/.
- The new **Ashurst Primary School** in Blackbrook continued to take shape. By August the building's steel frame was up, ongoing work was taking place to the first floor external walls, and the ground floor was ready for the concrete pour. Blackbrook Labour Councillors Anthony Burns, Linda Maloney and Paul McQuade said: "It's great to see this progress. It's been a long time coming and it's something we've fought hard for, so we're delighted to see it and can't wait for the new school to open. Our children right across the borough deserve the very best facilities and we'll continue to do everything we can to provide them."
- Two **Levelling Up Fund** bids were submitted to government by the council, for projects in Earlestown and St Helens town centres. September 2022 will always be remembered for the sad passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Our Borough came together to mark her life and give thanks.

- The whole borough was immensely saddened by the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Books of commemoration, floral
 tributes and more were left across St Helens. Services of thanks and remembrance were held across the borough, and Mayor of St
 Helens Cllr Sue Murphy led tributes on behalf of the borough. We will remember Her late Majesty's remarkable life with awe and
 gratitude.
- Crowds gathered in Victoria Square to witness the Mayor Cllr Sue Murphy read the proclamation of our new sovereign, King Charles III. The Mayor was accompanied by others including her Consort Mike Murphy, the Deputy Lieutenant David Steer KC, and Council Leader David Baines. Long live the King!
- Later in the month work resumed in earnest, beginning with confirmation that the council had been successful in securing almost
 £1m from the Government's Rough Sleeper Initiative (RSI) Fund to help us prevent rough sleeping through a programme focusing on

- We welcomed a **ground-breaking national art education project** to the borough. - The UK's first custom-built, hydrogen-fuelled waste collection vehicle arrived in St Helens Borough and was unveiled by Cllr Andy Bowden and Cllr Mancyia Uddin ahead of its integration into the council's fleet. It is a pioneering investment by our council, and forms part of our wider fleet and operational modernisation and our commitment to reach net-zero carbon emissions by 2040. The vehicle's unveiling in St Helens saw international partners and local stakeholders come together for a presentation at St Helens Town Hall about its merits and a demonstration of its green technology: https://www.sthelenslabour.org/latest-news/2022/09/21/hydrogen/. Cllr Andy Bowden said: "Our aspiration is to be at the forefront of a green revolution taking place in the region investing in renewables, diversifying the green skills of our workforce, future-proofing our services, hosting cutting-edge decarbonisation projects in industry and fostering climate action locally at grassroots. Supported by investment in electrics and the most efficient diesel vehicles, we have confidence that our decarbonisation plans can be introduced in a managed way that doesn't compromise service delivery to our residents. This vehicle represents our faith in the renewables sector as both a service provider and employer, and our commitment to net-zero emissions by 2040, and I'm delighted to see it arrive in the borough."

October was a month of contrasts. The cost of living emergency was making things increasingly difficult for households, businesses and service providers. Meanwhile the Rugby League World Cup finally kicked off with colour and fun and Labour won the Moss Bank by-election...

- Partners across St Helens Borough pledged to work collectively to support residents through the **cost of living crisis**.
